Rabbi Dr. Jay Michaelson holds a J.D. from Yale Law School, a Ph.D. in Jewish Thought from Hebrew University, and nondenominational rabbinic ordination. He is an affiliated assistant professor at Chicago Theological Seminary, and has held teaching positions at Harvard Divinity School and Boston University Law School. Dr. Michaelson is a columnist at The Daily Beast, focusing on law, religion, and LGBTQ equality, and was a professional religious LGBTQ activist for seven years. Academic publications include “Queering Kabbalistic Gender Dimorphism,” “Hating Law for Christian Reasons: The Religious Roots of American Anti-Lawyerism,” and “Chaos, Law, and God: The Religious Meanings of Homosexuality.” Books include *Everything is God: The Radical Path of Nondual Judaism* and *God vs. Gay? The Religious Case for Equality*, as well as the landmark 2013 report on the “religious exemptions” movement, “Redefining Religious Liberty: The Covert Campaign Against Civil Rights.”
